## **OUR MISSION IS SIMPLE**

## We rescue from the most extreme environments & circumstances

#### We Rescue from Our Own Backyard

Abandoned dogs and cats suffer from starvation, lack of companionship and exposure to the extreme weather conditions of Calgary's reserves and dumping areas every day.

#### The Notorious Dumping Grounds of Mexico

There is no such thing as a humane death in these pits, where dogs are either mauled to death due to starvation in crammed conditions, or electrocuted to death when numbers get too high.

#### **Overcrowded Animal Shelters in California**

Hundreds of dogs and cats are on death row simply because shelters lack the resources to continue to provide proper on-going care for them.

#### **Natural Disasters**

When Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans, our team was there to rescue dogs that had been left behind.

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF R-MAR

When Rocky Mountain Animal Rescue was first conceived in 2000, Rory O'Neill's focus was on the rescue of highly adoptable dogs and cats on death row in overcrowded animal shelters in Canada and California. She was also bringing in homeless dogs and puppies from the Stoney Nakota Reserve in the town of Morley, near Calgary. Her experience as a dog behaviourist allowed her to fully rehabilitate these animals and place them for adoption.

From there, knowledge of the Mexico dumping grounds and hoarders came to light after viewing its desperate situation on an episode of Cesar Millan's 'The Dog Whisperer'. They had crossed the California border into Tijuana (a very impoverished Mexican town) with Animal Advocates on a rescue mission to save some dogs in one of the dumping grounds. Rory quickly contacted Animal Advocates and began working along with them to coordinate more rescues. Within a few months, the first transport of six amazing little Chihuahuas and mixes flew from Los Angeles to the Rocky Mountain Animal Rescue for adoption in Canada.

The Rocky Mountain Animal Rescue really established itself as the go-to rescue for animals in some of the most extreme environments and circumstances in 2006 when our rescue efforts took us to the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans. We don't shy away from the tough stuff, and that is what sets us apart from most animal rescues in Canada.

Since 2000 (and the last revision of this handbook) we have rescued over 2, 926 animals. This number is growing exponentially as we continue to grow: 2014 sees the start of a new sanctuary, new programs, and the development of an amazing team of volunteers and success stories we're very proud of. And we truly can't wait for you to join us in accomplishing more!

## **OVERVIEW**

There are many areas in which you can dedicate your time and resources. These include the following:

- Sanctuary Team
- Adoption Team
- Marketing Team

- Rescue Team
- Transport Team
- Fundraising Team

#### Sanctuary Team // Reports to Sanctuary Coordinator & Administrative Coordinator

This team works in the daily care of the animals at the sanctuary. They also are involved with administrative duties and maintenance. These tasks include walking dogs, dog training, dog rehabilitation, animal grooming, filing, bookkeeping, feeding animals, cleaning crates, folding dog bedding, organizing pet supplies, and more. We also have a handful of trade-specific tasks for volunteers with certain skill sets, like landscaping, fixing enclosures, etc.

#### **Adoption Team // Reports to Adoption Coordinator**

This team understands and helps facilitate adoption processes. They help prepare animal profiles (pictures and write ups) and list these on our website, social media, and other venues like print. This team is also the face of R-mar at adoption events and helps the Adoption Coordinator with pending adoptions.

#### Rescue Team // Reports to Rescue Coordinator

This team is at the forefront of the rescues. The Rescue Coordinator will organize rescue trips to the reserves and other locations throughout the year and will call on a handful of people to help with these rescues. The rescue team is also responsible for emergency care of animals arriving in bad condition.

#### Transport Team // Reports to Transportation Coordinator

This team is a team of people who are essentially available for transporting animals to and from vet appointments, the airport, etc.

#### Fundraising Team // Reports to the Fundraising Coordinator

This team rocks the fundraising programs we put out there: they are the brains and faces to it all. Working together with the Fundraising Coordinator, ideas, programs and events will be planned, implemented and then tracked/measured for success.

#### Marketing Team // Reports to the Marketing Coordinator

The marketing team is our amazing group of writers, designers and marketing specialists who lend their skillset to the operations of our rescue. They work closely with the Marketing Coordinator – as well as the Advertising Coordinator and Development Coordinator.

#### **HOW YOU ARE CALLED IN TO VOLUNTEER**

- We understand that you have priorities. This is why all of Your Volunteer team members are on an ON CALL email alert system.
- When one of our coordinators need people to commit to a project, they send a message out via an email list.
- All we ask is that you offer a response, even if it's 'no' so that our coordinators know who is and isn't available.

# COMMUNICATION WITH COORDINATORS

#### **VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR**

- Your Volunteer Coordinator is your go-to for any questions, comments, concerns or suggestions you might have regarding your involvement with the Rocky Mountain Animal Rescue.
- You will be automatically added to a monthly reminder email list once your application is accepted. This monthly reminder is mandatory, and will be used for important announcements, as well as a reminder to complete your time tracking form (which is detailed below.)
- Your Volunteer Coordinator will give you your Team Coordinator's details once your application is accepted by our staff. It is your responsibility to initiate communication with your Team Coordinator.

#### **TEAM COORDINATOR**

- Your Team Coordinator is your go-to for any questions, comments, concerns or suggestions you might have regarding your involvement with your specific projects
- It is your responsibility to contact your Team Coordinator once you get their contact information from your Volunteer Coordinator. This will ensure that you get on your Team Coordinator's email alert list so that you can be made aware of upcoming volunteer opportunities/projects. We ask that you respond to all email alerts with a YES or NO.

### TIME TRACKING

Your Volunteer Coordinator will attach a link to a Volunteer Log form to your acceptance email, and will request that you complete this accurately at the end of every month to be submitted.

This form will ask you to list your completed tasks and hours for the month.

When your application for volunteering is accepted, your email will be automatically added to a monthly email list that will send you a reminder to complete this form.

Logging your hours and tasks helps us with requesting grants. Volunteer hours can be translated to dollars, which shows prospective funders that we already have adequate community support to get projects done.

We appreciate your timely completion of this form monthly.

## **PROCESSES**

- Complete and sign the Online Volunteer Application; this includes yYour Volunteer Agreement & Release of Liability
- You will receive an email from Your Volunteer Coordinator once your application is accepted with complete details of your involvement and the contact information of your team Coordinator.
- YYour Volunteer Coordinator will also attach a link to a Volunteer Log form and will request that you complete this accurately at the end of every month to be submitted. Logging your hours and tasks helps us with requesting grants.
- **Email your team Coordinator** introducing yourself, and include your preferred method of contact: phone number or email. Your team Coordinator will reply to you with details of upcoming projects, frequency of their on call alerts, etc.
- For your reference, we've attached hard copy of the Volunteer Agreement & Release of Liability below.
